## Find research evidence for interventions relevant to occupational therapy

It is now $\mathbf{1 0}$ years since OTseeker was launched and during that time there were over 12,060 articles indexed in OTseeker that can inform occupational therapists about the effects of interventions. This includes approximately 9,120 randomised controlled trials and 2,930 systematic reviews. Most randomised controlled trials up to 2013 have been critically appraised with respect to internal validity and these details are available on the website.

Given the rapid increase in the number of randomised controlled trials being published relevant to occupational therapy, in the future it will not be possible for the OTseeker team to rate all new trials that are entered into the database. However, we will seek to provide enhanced resources for therapists to be able to appraise trials themselves and provide ratings for some trials where possible.


OTseeker also contains other resources to support evidence based practice that can be accessd through the resources page on OTseeker, including a new database of Qualitative Evidence Syntheses called Quest.
